In 1919 Captain Cleveland transported two buildings from Fullerton to establish an outpost at Beach Point on the South side of Repulse Bay. In 1921 he established Repulse Bay as a Post because it was felt to be too far from Chesterfield to be treated as a Post.

In the winter of 1924/25 Captain Cleveland fell ill and was removed to Winnipeg for medical attention. He subsequently retired.

He died in September 1925

His wife, whom he shared with Keedluk, was called Tooteecheak. They had two daughters, the younger of whom was called Hannah.

Captain Cleveland was a well-known Arctic figure. The Nelson River District Manager, Christie Harding, said of him in 1919: "Mr. Cleveland is an old timer and has been 28 years in the country, which he knows well. He talks the Eskimo language, is a good trader, navigator and engineer - a jack of all trades, and the most practical man I met on my tour of inspection." (A.74/49, fo. 78)
