MOVING FORWARD ON CHILD CARE PRIORITIES

Manitoba Co-chairs Fourth Meeting of Federal, Provincial, and Territorial Ministers Most Responsible for Early Learning and Child Care

On January 30, federal, provincial, and territorial ministers responsible for early learning and child care met in Ottawa to review progress and discuss opportunities to maintain momentum on shared priorities as the Canada Wide Early Learning and Child Care Agreement enters its next phase. The meeting was co-chaired by the Honourable Tracy Schmidt, Manitoba's Minister of Education and Early Childhood Learning, and the Honourable Patty Hajdu, Canada's Minister of Jobs and Families and Minister responsible for the Federal Economic Development Agency for Northern Ontario.

The ministers emphasized the importance of long-term sustainability and system resilience, reaffirming their commitment to maintaining stability for families and providers while acknowledging the diverse circumstances across jurisdictions. They also underscored the need for equitable funding for the territories to address the unique challenges facing Northern communities. In addition, the ministers explored opportunities to reduce administrative burden, including streamlining reporting requirements to support the effective and efficient monitoring of progress.

Since 2021, all provinces and territories, including Manitoba, have reduced parent fees by at least 50 percent, improving affordability and supporting higher labour force participation among families, especially women. The ministers also highlighted continued growth in regulated spaces nationwide. As of January 2026, nearly 155,000 new Canada wide spaces have been created, with close to 210,000 more announced.

Child Care in Manitoba – Key Accomplishments

AGREEMENTS IN PLACE

Manitoba and the federal government extended the Canada-Manitoba and Canada Wide Early Learning and Child Care Agreements, securing approximately \$1.9 billion in investment over the next five years, through to March 31, 2031. This commitment will support continued efforts to expand access to affordable, inclusive, high-quality child care and strengthen the child care workforce.

A NEW WAY FORWARD

The new *Higher Wages, Good Jobs, More Child Care: Manitoba's Early Learning and Child Care Workforce Strategy* lays out a roadmap to recruit and support the child care workforce.

HIGHER WAGES

An updated wage grid and funding for wage increases, introduced in May 2025, sees frontline child care professional wages increase by up to \$5 an hour.

LOWER FEES

As of December 2024, \$10-a-day parent fees have been extended to include school-age children on non-school days, including in-service days and school holidays.

NEW SPACES

As of November 2025, through federal and provincial funding, over 5,400 spaces opened and more than 6,100 spaces were committed for a total of over 11,500 new spaces for children ages 0 to 6, with thousands more on the way.

Through provincial investment, over 4,450 school-age spaces have opened and almost 900 school-age spaces have been committed.

In total, over 9,850 spaces have opened and more than 7,000 spaces committed, for a total of over 16,850 spaces for children 12 and under throughout Manitoba.

Since 2022, the Federal, Provincial and Territorial Forum of Ministers Most Responsible for Early Learning and Child Care has served as a venue for collaboration on shared priorities, including quality of care, workforce supports, and stronger data. At this latest meeting, the ministers reaffirmed their commitment to supporting a stable, affordable, high-quality system for families and for the sector's workforce.

Webinar Recording Now Available: Competency-Based Assessment for Rural and Northern Participants—Intake, Spring 2026

Competency-based assessment (CBA) is a no-cost, self-directed assessment program in which child care assistants with five years of work experience in a licensed child care centre or nursery school may earn a classification of Early Childhood Educator (ECE) II upon successful completion of the program requirements, under the guidance of an advisor and peer assessor.

CBA is one of the four assessment streams of the [ECE II Assessment Program](#), with completion taking 18 to 24 months on average.



Nature Based Learning for Educators: A Four Season Journey in Land Led Teaching

Reconnect with learning as it was originally intended—rooted in land, relationship, and the natural rhythms that guide children's curiosity. Nature-Based Learning for Educators is an immersive, year-long professional development experience designed for Early Childhood Educators, teachers, and anyone working alongside children and youth. Grounded on Treaty 1 territory and shaped by Two-Eyed Seeing, the program weaves Indigenous and non Indigenous ways of knowing to support holistic, meaningful learning. Across four seasons, participants explore nature not only as a classroom, but as a teacher, a regulator, and a source of connection and reflection.

The program consists of seven in-person nature sessions and three virtual training sessions over the course of the four seasons at Fort Whyte Alive.

The Manitoba Nature Summit is an experiential, outdoor education conference for adults who teach children. We bring together educators from the early years and beyond (ELCC programs and K to 12 as well) for a professional development experience that happens every two years, since 2010. The mission is to inspire and engage educators of children, fostering creativity and adventure in their natural environment, while embracing healthy choices and sustainable living.

The Summit promotes and values land-based learning and play-based curriculum, Indigenous ways of being and knowing, with a large variety of workshops offered across two full days, all held outdoors. The 2026 Summit weaves together themes of risky play, forest school, arts-based curriculum, supporting neurodiverse children through outdoor play, Indigenous curriculum, and more.

FASD for School Staff Level II training is now available at no cost to all Manitobans—including Early Childhood Educators and Child Care Assistants and support staff until March 2026.



Each month, the division will answer a common inquiry received from facilities in a question-and-answer format.

This Month's Question

Where can I find The Community Child Care Standards Act and its regulations? Why is it important to be familiar with these documents?

Answer

All licensed child care in Manitoba must follow The Community Child Care Standards Act. The Act defines the types of child care situations that need licensing. Its regulations help make sure that child care in licensed centres and homes meets government standards. There are two regulations: Child Care Regulation (62/86) and Child Care Worker Retirement Benefits Regulation (20/2011).

The act and its regulations are legal requirements and make sure:

- Early learning and child care environments contribute to the health, safety, and well-being of children.
- There are activities to promote children's physical, social, emotional, and intellectual development.
- Parents are involved in the operation or management of centres.

La vie est belle à la Garderie-Arc-en-Ciel!

English version follows

Ce mois-ci, nous mettons en vedette la Garderie Arc-en-Ciel de Notre-Dame-de-Lourdes et une de leurs employées : Charlotte McPherson. Charlotte est une éducatrice des jeunes enfants de niveau II (EJE II) et travaille à la Garderie Arc-en-Ciel depuis près de 28 ans.

« Je suis née ici à Notre-Dame-de-Lourdes. Il y a plusieurs années, il y avait un manque d'employés au centre et on m'a demandé si cela m'intéressait. J'ai décidé d'essayer pour un an et presque 28 ans plus tard, je suis encore ici! »

Charlotte a travaillé comme aide des services à l'enfance (ASE) pendant cinq ans avant de devenir EJE II grâce au programme d'évaluation de l'admissibilité au titre d'EJE II.

« Le programme d'évaluation de l'admissibilité au titre d'EJE II était tellement bien pour moi et ma famille. Je n'avais pas besoin de conduire jusqu'à Winnipeg et d'être présente en classe. Aussi, en même temps, je pouvais continuer à travailler à temps plein au centre. »

La Garderie Arc-en-Ciel fêtera ses 30 ans dans quelques mois. C'est un centre dédié à la promotion de la langue française et de la culture francophone. C'est le seul centre à Notre-Dame-de-Lourdes et il accueille plus de 100 enfants et emploie 21 personnes.

« Le fait d'avoir un centre 100 % francophone donne la chance aux enfants d'apprendre une deuxième langue, parfois même une troisième langue. Des parents des communautés avoisinantes amènent leurs enfants à notre centre pour qu'ils puissent apprendre le français. »



Le sentiment de communauté est très fort dans le village de Notre-Dame-de-Lourdes. Les enfants participent activement à la vie communautaire en visitant différents établissements dont le foyer pour personnes âgées.

« Lorsque la température le permet, nous visitons le foyer une fois par semaine. On crée un bon lien entre les enfants et les personnes âgées en faisant des activités. C'est excitant pour les enfants parce que c'est une expérience différente. »

Récemment, Charlotte a obtenu le prix d'éducatrice exceptionnelle en éducation de la petite enfance (francophone) de 2025 lors de la première cérémonie de remise des Prix du Manitoba pour l'excellence en éducation de la petite enfance. Elle a été reconnue pour avoir joué un rôle clé dans la mise en place d'un programme de grande qualité en français. De plus, sa présence chaleureuse favorise le développement social et émotionnel des enfants. Elle entretient des relations solides et de confiance avec les enfants et les familles.

« Quand j'ai vu la lettre de nomination des parents et de ma directrice adjointe, ça m'a fait du bien au cœur. Ça m'a rappelé que tout ce que j'ai accompli est important et que c'est reconnu. C'était un très grand honneur d'être nominée et lauréate. »

Toute la communauté de la Garderie Arc-en-Ciel est bien fière de Charlotte! Bravo!

La vie est belle à la Garderie-Arc-en-Ciel!

This month, we are featuring La Garderie Arc-en-Ciel (meaning Rainbow Daycare) in Notre-Dame-de-Lourdes and one of their employees: Charlotte McPherson. Charlotte is an Early Childhood Educator II (ECE II) and has been working at Garderie Arc-en-Ciel for nearly 28 years.

"I was born here in Notre-Dame-de-Lourdes. Many years ago, the centre was short-staffed and they asked me if I was interested. I decided to try it for a year, and almost 28 years later, I'm still here!"

Charlotte worked as a Child Care Assistant (CCA) for five years before becoming an ECE II through the ECE II Assessment Program.

"The ECE II Assessment Program worked so well for me and my family. I didn't have to drive to Winnipeg or attend classes in person. Also, at the same time, I could continue working full-time at the centre."

Garderie Arc-en-Ciel will celebrate its 30th anniversary in a few months. It is a centre dedicated to promoting the French language and Francophone culture. It is the only child care centre in Notre-Dame-de-Lourdes, welcoming more than 100 children and employing 21 staff members.

"Having a 100 per cent Francophone centre gives children the chance to learn a second language, sometimes even a third. Parents from nearby communities bring their children to our centre so they can learn French."

A strong sense of community exists in the village of Notre-Dame-de-Lourdes. Children actively take part by visiting local establishments, including the seniors' home.

"When the weather allows it, we visit the seniors' home once a week. We create a strong bond between the children and the seniors through different activities. It's exciting for the children because it's a different kind of experience."

Recently, Charlotte received the 2025 Outstanding Early Childhood Educator (Francophone) Award at the first ever Manitoba Early Childhood Educator Awards of Excellence. She was recognized for playing a key role in establishing a high-quality French-language program. In addition, her warm presence supports the children's social and emotional development. She maintains strong, trusting relationships with the children and their families.

"When I saw the nomination letter written by the parents and my assistant director, it warmed my heart. It reminded me that everything I've accomplished is important and appreciated. It was a great honour to be nominated and to win."

The entire Garderie Arc-en-Ciel community is very proud of Charlotte! Bravo!

I like to joke that I'm polylingual. I could say quadrilingual: I speak French, Portuguese, Arabic, and English. Those aren't just skills on a resume; I use them all the time in my work. I get a lot of Arabic calls, especially from new immigrants from Syria and other Arabic speaking countries. Many of them struggle with English and don't speak French, so they don't know who to talk to. When I hear a certain accent, I'll ask, "Do you speak Arabic? I can help you with that." Then the conversation flips into Arabic right away. Sometimes a call will go from English to French to Arabic. That just makes my day. I joke that I just need to add some Cantonese.

Meet the ELCC Team

I started my government journey in 2022 with Employment and Income Assistance (EIA) in the Department of Families. I joined ELCC in April 2024. I'll be honest, I was terrified. New department, new office, new people. But from day one, when I arrived, I thought, "This is where I'm staying. I like what I'm doing here."

I'm a dentist from back home. Coming to Canada meant I would have to retrain from scratch, and with family responsibilities, that just wasn't realistic. I started looking at what I could bring with me and build on. One of those things was language.

I'm originally from Palestine, but I grew up in Libya. People are often surprised when they hear me speak French, as Libya isn't a Francophone country. My mom somehow had the idea to put us in a French school to get a second language beside Arabic. I received my *diplôme national du brevet* (DNB) from the French international school in Tripoli (created for the French community that came with the oil companies). My family also has strong ties to Brazil. In 2002, I moved from Libya to Brazil and lived there for almost a year. That's where I picked up Portuguese.

A Division by any other name...

English: Manitoba Early Learning and Child Care

French: Apprentissage et garde des jeunes enfants au Manitoba

Portuguese: Manitoba Aprendizagem Precoce e Creches

Arabic :

التعليم المبكر ورعاية الأطفال في مانيتوبا

An average day for me is quite busy. We start with applications, calls, and walk in intakes to review their documentation, and we also handle facility reports and adjustments

— a lot of them. I'd say I talk to about 10 to 15 people a day, both in person and over the phone. Each facility is assigned an advisor like me. I help make sure reports are submitted correctly, that children's attendance is recorded properly, and that absences aren't missed. Some facilities think that if they report children as absent, they might not get paid, but that's not the case. You just have to fill in your report as per the attendance of the children. Accuracy is important.

As a mother of two, this work is personal. I know how important child care is in those first years before school, and I know the nightmare of wait lists and worrying about having a spot. Having a child care space is a big help. So it feels good being able to help other families navigate what can be a complex system in a language they're at home with.

Staffing Updates

We continue to welcome new staff into our division to support Manitoba's priorities for early learning and child care and support career growth and development of existing staff.

Denise Desrosiers joined the Policy and Planning Branch, Continuous Improvement and Engagement Unit as Manager, Business Planning and Technology Services at 114 Garry Street on Tuesday, February 17. Denise holds an honours diploma in Digital Media Technology from Red River College Polytechnic, and holds certifications as a business analyst, usability analyst, and service manager.
