Secretary's Statement.
"According to an official report received this evening, the
terms of the armistice to be offered to Germany have just been
agreed to unanimously and signed by representatives of the Allies
and the United States in Paris. The report further states that
diplomatic unity has been completely achieved under conditions
of the utmost harmony."
It is understood the terms are to be submitted to Germany im-
mediately, and that their publication in full will follow shortly.
The statement has been authorized that the drastic conditions under
which Austria dropped out of the war today furnish an accurate
indication of their nature.

Washington, Nov. 4.—A Washington analysis by military officers of both allied and American, the terms of the Austrian armistice which are said to be no more drastic than those for Germany are interpreted to mean absolute surrender. Nothing is left to the good faith of the vanquished Germans and no restrictions or limitations are imposed upon the victors.

These officers believe Germany, left alone, also must throw herself without reserve upon the mercy of the victors.

Final adjustments, territorial or otherwise, are all deferred to the conference, for which the cessation of hostilities paves the way.

The German appeal for an armistice was submitted on the basis of acceptance of the peace terms already outlined by President Wilson and when the discussion starts the Allies and the United States will be in a position to dictate its results. In
