It should be clearly understood that the Canadian Registration Certificates given on June 22, 1918, at the time of general registration, in no way define the status of a man under the Military Service Act.

Request For Immediate Armie tice Refused By Foch. Says Report From

Paris, Nov. 8 .- The German oproys reached Marshal Foch's head quarters at 2 o'clock this morning. Eizberger heads the mission.

At 10 o'clock they met Marshal Foch and asked for an immediate armistice. This was refused.

Mershal Foch gave them 72 hours to accept the terms of unconditional surrender, or attacks will be re-


