Pursuant to Rule 26(1), Mrs. DRIEDGER, Messrs. SANTOS, TWEED and CALDWELL and Hon. Mr. GERRARD made Members' Statements.

The House resumed the Interrupted Debate on the Proposed Motion of Mr. JENNISSEN:

THAT the following address be presented to His Honour the Lieutenant Governor:

We, the Members of the Legislative Assembly of Manitoba thank your Honour for the gracious speech addressed to us at this Second Session of the Thirty-Eighth Legislature of Manitoba.

And the proposed amendment moved by Mr. MURRAY as follows:

THAT the Motion be amended by adding at the end of the sentence the following words:

But this House regrets

(a) the government's inability to fulfill the promises outlined in its Throne Speech of November 27, 2002, including the following failures: failing to build the economy, failing to enhance health care, and failing to open 1,000 new cottage lots and 1,000 new camp-sites; and

(b) the government's failure to meaningfully address the growing concerns related to organized crime including the fact that since November 2000 Manitoba has been the scene of 37 biker-related murders and attempted murders; and

(c) the government's failure to develop a long-term economic strategy to address anaemic job growth; and

(d) the government's failure to adequately address the BSE crisis and to provide workable programs for producers, thereby threatening not only the stability of the livestock sector but all those other sectors in Manitoba's economic that are so reliant on its well-being; and

(e) the government's failure to recognize and encourage the important role private sector involvement has in growing Manitoba's economy; and

(f) the government's failure to acknowledge that balanced budgets have only been achieved through significant raids on Manitoba Hydro and the Fiscal Stabilization Fund; and

(g) the government's failure to initiate a review of health care regionalization; and

(h) the government's failure to develop a long-term economic and taxation strategy to address Manitoba's uncompetitive personal and business tax levels; and

(i) the government's failure to provide a strategy ensuring two-thirds of all nursing positions in Manitoba are full-time by the spring of 2004 as previously committed; and

(j) the government's failure to follow through on their commitment to ensure access to education for special needs students.

AND HAS THEREBY lost the trust and confidence of the people of Manitoba and this House.

And the debate continuing on the amendment,

And Mr. ALTEMEYER and Hon. Mr. GERRARD having spoken.

And Hon. Mr. GERRARD moved a sub-amendment as follows:

THAT the amendment be amended by adding thereto the following words:

THAT this House further regrets:

1. that since assuming office this government has been both arrogant and extreme in its disregard for the people of Manitoba; and

2. that this government has no plan to address child poverty in Manitoba, the highest in Canada, and instead blames the federal government for this problem; and

3. that this government has not been forthright with the people of Manitoba in outlining its plans for health reform, leading to uncertainty amongst patients and health care providers and cutbacks in health services and lost jobs; and

4. that this government has failed to have any environmental strategy in place to protect the quality of water and quantity of downstream water in this province; and

5. that failing to adequately fund an education system that will meets the needs of our future citizens and workforce; and

6. that failing to implement an effective strategy to address the growing problem on criminal gang activity, by offering hope and opportunities for youth who are being lured into gangs, accompanied by an effective justice system response to gang crime.

WHEREUPON Mr. Deputy Speaker ruled the sub-amendment in order.

And the debate continuing on the sub-amendment,

And Mr. LAMOUREUX having spoken. The debate was allowed to remain open.
