Resolution No. 19: Supporting a Foreign Trade Zone at CentrePort Canada

WHEREAS the Progressive Conservative Caucus is a longtime supporter of the formation of an inland port; and

WHEREAS CentrePort provides much potential for numerous economic benefits for Manitoba businesses and can position Manitoba as a global trade leader; and

WHEREAS an inland port's long-term viability is based on its ability to facilitate and encourage trade between jurisdictions; and

WHEREAS Manitoba is a trading province and has developed strong economic ties with many countries, especially the United States; and

WHEREAS Manitoba is strategically positioned to help facilitate global trade and is positioned well within North American transport corridors; and

WHEREAS the North American Mid Continent Corridor and the Asia Pacific Gateway are becoming increasingly important trade corridors in supply systems; and

WHEREAS many established inland ports in the North American Mid Continent Corridor such as Kansas City offer foreign trade zones; and

WHEREAS many companies when choosing where to locate will analyze the geographic position and incentives offered by a jurisdiction; and

WHEREAS foreign trade zones help to facilitate international trade and increase the competitive advantage of an inland port; and

WHEREAS foreign trade zones can increase the manufacturing viability of a jurisdiction increasing economic activity and jobs.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislative Assembly of Manitoba urge the Provincial Government to support the establishment of a foreign trade zone at CentrePort Canada.

Bills Considered and Reported

• **Bill (No. 217)** – The Hunting, Fishing and Trapping Heritage Act/Loi sur la chasse, la pêche sportive et le piégeage patrimoniaux

Your Committee agreed to report this Bill, with the following amendment:

THAT Clause 2 of the Bill be replaced with the following:

Aboriginal rights protected

- This Act is not to be interpreted so as to abrogate or derogate from the aboriginal and treaty rights of the aboriginal peoples of Canada that are recognized and affirmed by section 35 of the *Constitution Act, 1982*.

Your Committee agreed to report this Bill without amendment.

• Bill (No. 238) – The Service Animals Protection Act/Loi sur la protection des animaux d'assistance

Your Committee agreed to report this Bill, with the following amendment:

THAT the following be added after Clause 3 of the Bill:

Animal obedience training

3.1 If a justice finds a person guilty of an offence under subsection 2(2), the justice may, in a probation order and in addition to any other penalty, prescribe that the person attend animal obedience training with the animal that touched, impeded or interfered with the service animal.

On motion of Mr. REID, the Report of the Committee was received.

Pursuant to Rule 26(1), Messrs. SARAN, CULLEN, JHA, and MAGUIRE and Ms. MARCELINO made Members' Statements.

Prior to Grievances, Mr. HAWRANIK rose on a Matter of Urgent Public Importance and moved:

THAT in accordance with Rule 36(1), the ordinary business of the House be set aside to discuss a Matter of Urgent Public Importance, namely, the lockout of workers at Tembec.

And Mr. HAWRANIK, Hon. Mr. CHOMIAK and Mr. LAMOUREUX (by leave) having spoken to the urgency of the motion,

WHEREUPON Mr. Speaker ruled as follows:

I thank the Honourable Members for their advice to the Chair on whether the motion proposed by the Honourable Official Opposition House Leader should be debated today. The notice required by Rule 36(1) was provided. Under our Rules and Practices, the subject matter requiring urgent consideration must be so pressing that the public interest will suffer if the matter is not given immediate attention. There must also be no other reasonable opportunities to raise the matter.

I have listened very carefully to the arguments put forward, however I was not persuaded that the ordinary business of the house should be set aside to deal with this issue today. Although this is an issue that some Members may have a concern about, I do not believe that the public interest will be harmed if the business of the house is not set aside to debate the motion today.

Additionally, I would like to note that other avenues exist for Members to raise this issue, including Question Period, Members' Statements and Grievances.

Therefore, with the greatest of respect, I must rule that this matter does not meet the criteria set by our Rules and Precedents and I rule the motion out of order as a Matter of Urgent Public Importance.

However, despite the procedural shortcomings, there does appear to be a willingness to debate the issue. I shall then put the Question to the House shall the debate proceed?

Mr. Speaker then put the Question, "Shall the debate proceed?" It was agreed to.
