


Manitoba's CPI Up 0.4% in April, Decelerating from March

The Manitoba All-items Consumer Price Index (CPI) rose 0.4% in April 2024 compared with March 2024. This is down 0.4 points from the March 2024 increase, remaining below the Bank of Canada's target range of 1-3%. Canada's annual rate of price increase in April is 2.7%, a decrease of 0.2 percentage points compared to March's rate (Table 1).

Manitoba: April 2024




Services with the Highest Contribution to Price Growth, 1.3 Points


The colourful chart presents the relative contributions of Food, Energy, Durables, Services, and Other to Manitoba's year -over-year price growth. Services, with a relative CPI weight of 48.5%, contributed 1.3 points toward Manitoba's 0.4% price growth this month. This is closely followed by Food, which represents 16.8% of CPI basket weight and accounted for 0.3 points of the CPI growth. Durable goods (13.5% CPI weight) accounted for a decline of 0.2 points in the overall CPI, while Other (12.8% CPI weight) contributed to a decline of 0.3 points in the overall CPI increase. Finally, Energy, which represents 8.4% of CPI basket weight, accounted for a decline of 0.7 points.

Manitoba's Inflation Remains the Lowest Among Provinces

At 0.4%, Manitoba has the lowest all-items price increase among the Canadian provinces in the month of April. This is followed by Saskatchewan at 1.0%, while Nova Scotia saw the largest increase this month, at 3.1% (Table 2).

The growth in the Winnipeg all-items index remained at 0.5% in April, and ranked lowest among the 16 major Canadian cities, while Calgary (+3.6%), Halifax (+3.4%) and Toronto (+3.2%), were among the highest (Table 4).





Shelter and Health & Personal Care Lead Manitoba's Price Growth

Manitoba saw an increase in year-over-year price growth for four of eight categories: Shelter, Health & personal care, Household operations, furnishings & equipment, and Clothing & footwear, compared to the rates in March 2024. Moreover, the remaining categories recorded negative year-over-year growth this month: Recreation, education & reading, Alcoholic beverages & tobacco products & recreational cannabis, Food, and Transportation.

Manitoba's Shelter costs accelerated to an increase of 5.3% on a year-over-year basis in April, after increasing by 4.8% in March. Nationally, Shelter costs are up 6.4%, a 0.1 percentage point decrease from March.

Health & personal care prices decelerated from an increase of 3.1% in March to an increase of 3.2% in April. Nationally, Health & personal care prices are up 3.0% year-over-year, a 0.2 percentage point decrease from March.

Among the major components in Manitoba, Recreation, education & reading saw the largest change, a 2.3 percentage point decrease, from an increase of 1.3% in March, to a decrease of 1.0% in April. Nationally, Recreation, education & reading costs are down 0.9% in comparison to April of last year.

From Table 5a, Mortgage interest cost and Rent led the top 5 contributors to the 12-month change in CPI. Also on the list are Food purchased from restaurants, Homeowners' home & mortgage insurance, and Passenger vehicle parts, maintenance & repairs. Individual items limiting CPI growth this month include Gasoline, Telephone services, Natural gas, Recreational equipment & services (excluding recreational vehicles), and Women's clothing.

Note to Readers

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is an indicator of changes in consumer prices experienced by Canadians. It is obtained by comparing, over time, the cost of a fixed basket of goods and services purchased by consumers. Since the basket contains goods and services of unchanging or equivalent quantity and quality, the index reflects only pure price change. The CPI is widely used as an indicator of the change in the general level of consumer prices or the rate of inflation. Since the purchasing power of money is affected by changes in prices, the CPI is useful to virtually all Canadians. Consumers can compare movements in the CPI to changes in their personal income to monitor and evaluate changes in their financial situation.
