




Mysterious Mammal

Hecla once had a very healthy population of this animal. Figure out what animal it is by connecting the dots.




Did you know?


Predators and Prey

All animals are found somewhere in nature's food chain. Some are predators (hunters), and some are prey. Match the predator with its favourite prey. Can you name other predator prey connections?




Fishing Fiasco


Fossil Find




Pelican Race
